Woodson and the prominent minister, Jesse E. Moorland founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, an organization dedicated to researching and promoting achievements by Black Americans and other people of African descent.

Known today as the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH), the group sponsored a national Negro History week in 1926, choosing the second week in February to coincide with birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick

Douglass. The event inspired schools and communities nationwide to organize local celebrations, establish history clubs and host performances and lectures.
